One of those pictures was of a camellia, and it brought back pleasant memories of my brief "sojourn" living in an LA suburb ten years ago. February was Camellia month! The garden club I belonged to (shout out to the West Lake Village Garden Club!) had a great speaker one February who gave us a history and overview of the many varieties. I had been unaware that the tea we drink comes from the young leaves of the Camellia Sinesis; camellias have several different flower forms including single, double, anemone form, peony form, rose form double, and formal double; blooming seasons vary with climate and different cultivars. If you plan well and live in a suitable climate, you can have camellias blooming year round! And here's a fun tip for transporting blossoms: stick the cut end into a large grape and it will get fluid and sugar to keep it fresh until you are ready to put the blossom into an arrangement...or to place next to a dinner plate for a fancy meal. My curiosity piqued by the speaker, the following weekend I grabbed my husband and off we went to Descanso Gardens in La Canada. The 19-acre camellia gardens are at their peak in February and it was a glorious day well spent.
